



Throughout this coming week, we will be learning about the Nharangga language and culture, particularly the dreaming stories of this country: Winda The Owl and Buthera's Rock. We will focus on art work, language and literacy that helps develop our awareness and understanding of local indigenous culture.

As of next week (Monday 31st May) we will be extending this to the afternoons (2.45-3.15pm) as a Pick-up only Zone, no parking between these times.




BABY CONGRATULATIONS

WHOLE SCHOOL MASS

This week our whole school returned to the Parish church, Our Lady Star of the Sea, after it was closed March 2020! Our community celebrated the great Christian feast of Pentecost – the coming of the Holy Spirit -with a beautiful Mass. Reconciliation with Indigenous peoples was also a focus of the Mass, alongside celebrating 200 Years of Catholic Education in Australia. For many of our students it was a completely new experience! We did something a little different at the beginning of Mass. Symbolising the life-giving pulse of the Holy Spirit, of 200 Years of life-giving Catholic Education, pulse of our community and of Reconciliation with the First People of Australia, the Year 7 students tapped out a "living" pulse with clapping sticks to welcome everyone to our Eucharistic celebration.



FEAST OF PENTECOST

Pentecost (meaning 'fifty' in Greek) marks the end of the Easter Season, fifty days after the Resurrection of Jesus to New Life. Pentecost is the name given to the Jewish feast of Weeks, a harvest festival. It is celebrated seven weeks, or fifty days, after

the Jewish feast of Passover. Fifty days after the resurrection, Jerusalem would have been filled with visitors from all over the ancient Middle Eastern world, gathering to celebrate the Feast of Weeks – Pentecost.

It was at the time of one of these large gatherings, which also included the disciples of Jesus, that the Holy Spirit of Jesus, in the physical forms of fire and wind, symbolising strength, came to the disciples and all who had gathered. Jesus had promised the disciples that he would be with them till the end of ages, and he is, through the Holy Spirit.



The Holy Spirit, at Pentecost, brought to the disciples, and all the people, the strength and courage to know God through the message of Jesus, to share the message of Jesus throughout the world and to do so with courage and strength. In today's world, the movement of the Holy spirit is still welcomed into our lives, to help us to make fair and just decisions for the good of all, to courageously share the message of Jesus and to know God and to make this world a better place. It was at this coming of the Holy Spirit that the followers of Jesus became a purposeful, connected group – which we know today as the world-wide Christian Church. Pentecost marks the birth of the Church.




Pope Francis shares some simple understandings about Pentecost in his book, *Walking with Jesus*. After the death of Jesus, no one expected any more from the disciples. They were now just a small insignificant group who had lost their leader and Master. An unexpected event occurred while they all gathered in cowardice and fear of the Jews (who had cooperated with the Romans to execute Jesus). Suddenly they were all filled with the courage of the Holy Spirit which came to them in the symbolic form of a big wind and flames. People were astonished because each of them could hear the disciples talking in their own

language as they told of the great works of God. The Church born at Pentecost is an astounding community because a new message is proclaimed - the resurrection of Jesus Christ - and in a new language – the language of love. The disciples were now able to speak with courage and confidence as the life of the Holy Spirit of Jesus flowed through them.

CELEBRAING THE LEGACY - 200 YEARS CATHOLIC EDUCATION

The first Catholic school in Australia was founded in October 1820 by Irish Catholic priest Fr John Therry and run by convict and lay person George Marley. The school, which Catholic historians believe was in Hunter Street, Parramatta, taught 31 students. By 1833, there were 10 Catholic schools in the colony. Only 49 years later, our school was founded in 1869 by St Mary MacKillop. Over 200 years, outside of government schools, Catholic schools have grown to become the largest provider of schooling in Australia with one in five school age students attending a Catholic school.

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2021 27TH MAY-3RD JUNE



The focus of National Reconciliation Week 2021, <u>More than a word:</u> <u>Reconciliation takes action</u>, inspires us as individuals, a community, a nation, towards a more courageous and impactful intention and action. For us as a Catholic school, we embrace a deep, spiritual drive towards reconciliation with our Indigenous sisters and brothers as well as with each other. We open our hearts and our minds to the movement and wisdom of the Holy Spirit within us so that we can be agents of change, of justice, of understanding the needs of others and standing up for right, courage, reconciliation.

National Reconciliation Week has already begun in the St Mary MacKillop School community which is endeavouring to build a culture of knowledge and connection with the Nharangga people of Yorke Peninsula, *Guuranda*,

their traditional country. As is explained in the Nharangga Cultural Language Resource Book, "the word Narungga is the old pre-renewal- of- language spelling that was in use when the Narungga Aboriginal Progress Association was set up and incorporated. Nharangga is the correct spelling of the word in language and should always be used when referring to the people, language, Country or culture."



We are building a connection with local linguist and passionate specialist in the Nharangga language and culture, Tania Wanganeen who is very keen to work with our school community. We also have an authentic and valued connection with the Narungga Aboriginal Progress Association. Winda the Owl and Badhara's Rock are the two Nharangga Dreaming Stories with which our students will engage.

Last Monday morning a Welcome to Country was proclaimed by Nharangga family, Nevayah and Izack Karpany
