RECEPTION 2022

I have almost completed the meetings and school tours with the families and children who will be commencing in 2022 Term 1 with us in Reception. At this stage we have 20 students commencing with us in Reception at the beginning of next year. The transition visits for these children will take place on Thursdays for five weeks; Week 2-6 inclusive. The first two visits will be for 2 hours, the third for 3 hours and the final two visits for two full days.

Our Reception enrolment is significant for the very existence of our school and why we are here, therefore our whole school supports the visits and welcomes these young people and their families.

PE/SPORT R-7

Lisa will continue to teach R-7 PE lessons. For the first four weeks of term, Tennis coaching clinics have been arranged through the Sporting Schools funding scheme. The lessons will take place on Wednesday and Friday at the town courts, coaching by Sam Clayson. Students will catch the bus to the courts (thank you to Paul and Fr Matthew!).

Following the four weeks of tennis, we will revert to PE lessons across Thursday and Friday as we had in Term 1 and 2. Class teachers will keep in touch with parents about appropriate days for students to wear their sport uniform.

COVID SAFE PRACTICES

Thank you very much for your support of our practices of scanning in and signing in to our school site, wearing masks, using sanitiser and observing social distancing. These practices need to continue please.

Parents are able to come into the school for specific purposes such as volunteering, important conversations with teachers and staff. We are not at the stage that we can welcome parents who want to come for social visits, as hard as this may be, please continue to observe this.

OUR MORNING ROUTINE

Each aspect of our morning routine here at St Mary MacKillop School is deliberately thought through and has a specific purpose behind it.

Our school is officially 'open' from 8.20am. This is the time when have two staff on duty. While our teachers arrive much earlier than this, it is important to note that our staff spend a lot of time in the morning preparing for the day ahead and occasionally in meetings. As such, I ask that students not arrive prior to this time. We understand that occasionally with work or other commitments this is difficult, and with some prior notice we can accommodate the occasional early arrival in the front office, it is important to note however, that we need to be aware of this before the day.

Once students arrive at school they independently carry their own bag into school and unpack their bag, placing lunch box, communication book or diary and other belongings in the class room. This fosters independence and a sense of ownership over their belongings and learning. We are so proud of our younger students who have developed great independence with this morning routine.

Students are then asked to move quickly over to the oval for morning play. This is for two important reasons. Firstly, research and personal experience tells us that getting some exercise and fresh air prior to heading into the classroom increases a student's 'readiness to learn'. Secondly, it gives our teachers the time and space to prepare and organise their day. Occasionally, teachers will have meetings or not be in the room and so duty of care and supervision of students in the designated space of the oval is an important consideration.

At 8:50am the bell rings and students will walk over to the classroom ready for the day ahead.

7-9 SECONDARY COME AND TRY DAY - POSTPONED

Previously a Come and Try Day in our secondary facility was advertised for this coming Sunday afternoon 17th October. This has been postponed for now as we are still awaiting fitting out the 7-9 secondary facility with equipment. It will be much more fun and more to see and do if we wait until this all arrives. I will keep in touch and let you know of an alternative date.


HAPPY TERM 4


Welcome back to an active last term! We hope that your holidays were most enjoyable.

In the wider Catholic Church, the month of October is known as World Mission Month. It is dedicated to raising the awareness of the needs of those living in poverty. **Act for Justice: Have Less Day** is the annual focus for SMMS's participation in the Catholic Mission promotion of advocacy for people in need and will take place next **Wednesday**, **20**th **October 2021**. This Plain Bread Roll Day for Catholic Mission is intended to be an overall experience for our students.

There is a sacred connection to the bread roll. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." John 6:35 Bread nourishes us; Jesus nourishes us through his message for fair and just living by showing us God; in the prayer which Jesus taught us, the Our Father, we pray...give us this day our daily bread...

This year, students across Australia, including those at St Mary MacKillop School, will learn about the missionary work of the Good Shepherd Sisters in Thailand who, through their Kindergarten Centre, are bringing about generational change to some of the poorest communities in Bangkok. St Mary MacKillop School community will contribute to this world-wide occasion of prayer, sharing stories of mission and social justice and charity in our own way.

Our "Act for Justice, Have Less Day" next Wednesday has four parts to it. Our students are encouraged to fully and generously participate in this community Social Justice event.

* Act for Justice, Have Less Recess - The students are encouraged to bring fruit as a small recess snack, in solidarity with those children in the slums of Bangkok who are living in poverty, with much less access to fruit and no access to processed or "junk" food. Their staple diet is rice. This may in some small way help our students to be attentively aware of acting justly in our world while helping others to a better life by being generous.

*Whole School Prayer Gathering in the MPLA at 12:00pm.

* Act for Justice, Have Less Lunch - A plain bread roll will be supplied for lunch for everyone. We are asking <u>all</u> of our students to participate, to forgo their yummy snacks and big lunches and drinks on that day and instead have water and a lesser snack for recess and a bread roll for lunch.

* Act for Justice, Have Less Day - In addition, our students will be invited to wear coloured socks on this day as an extra fun way to trigger an awareness of this focus on the needs of others.

Bernie Thomson APRIM and Pastoral Care Support Thank you to all of the families who gave up their time to visit their child's classroom during the recent Learning Expo. Students sharing their work with their parents develops 'agency', or ownership of their learning. Our student-lead Learning Expo fostered agency, and was a highly successful evening evident in the excitement expressed by the children.

Below is a snapshot of the feedback received from Reception to Year 7 families:

1. What did you like about the Learning Expo?

- The insights into what's happening in the classroom and the student's perspective on their learning.
- Finding out about what he has been up to and see the work he has done and how well he has done.
- It's great to see all his hard work, it's brilliant to have him so proud and enjoy reading it all to me.
- Loved seeing our children's schoolwork and coming into class.
- Great to see what the class has been up to and have it child lead.
- You could come at your leisure throughout the night.

2. On a rating of 1 to 10 how useful/valuable was the expo to you?

88% of respondents from Years' 4 to 7 rated the night between 8 and 10, out of 10

82% of respondents from Reception to Year 3 rated the night between 8 and 10, out of 10

3. Why did you rate it that way?

- Love the interaction between the students and their parents on the success in the classroom.
- He spoke very positively about the things he enjoyed and about his challenges and goals.
- Enjoyed the layout and student participation.
- Good to see the kids explain and show their work themselves, they were very proud.

100% of families from Reception to Year 7 reported that they would like to see the Learning Expo continue in future years.

In 2022 and beyond

Due to the overwhelming positive feedback from families, we are planning to continue the Learning Expo. Parent Teacher Interviews will still take place in Term 1 and the Learning Expo will replace interviews in Term 3. Next year, as Catholic Education transitions into using SEQTA, parents will be able to access their child's results regularly via this platform, thus requiring fewer formal interviews. Bearing this in mind, we are offering a last chance survey for you to indicate your preference around the continuation of our Learning Expo. The survey is one question only requiring a yes/no response and is anonymous.
