

COVID UPDATE

1. Parents and visitors on site

PLAYING SAFELY

Following serious student accidents during soccer games, one last term and one last week, we have discussed and reviewed supervision and how students are playing. The accidents were the result of normal play and were certainly not targeted or malicious in any way.

We have, however reminded all students about playing safely: "hands-off and feet-off". All students know that tackling and rough physical contact, whether this be in football, soccer, or in any form is not acceptable. The consequence for inappropriate play, is to immediately sit out and miss out on play time, more serious contact is addressed by the Principal.

Sometimes the students in their enthusiasm and competitiveness forget that they are not playing a real competition game with umpires right there for the sole purpose of umpiring the game, they are supposed to be having a fun game in the school yard.

Staff continually reinforce this and we ask you to please follow this up with a discussion at home with your children too.

SOCIAL JUSTICE - CATHOLIC MISSION MONTH

ACT FOR JUSTICE: HAVE LESS; PLAIN BREAD ROLL DAY







Thank you to all families and students who supported, and participated in, our whole school social justice activities last Tuesday, 19th October- **Act for Justice: Have Less Day.**

This special day is the annual focus for the participation of St Mary MacKillop School on behalf of the Catholic Mission organization which promotes advocacy for people who live in poverty and have far less opportunities for living a better life than they currently have. Our students learned about the missionary work of the Good Shepherd Sisters in Thailand who, through their Kindergarten Centre, are bringing about generational change to some of the poorest communities in the slums of Bangkok. This Plain Bread Roll Day for Catholic Mission was an overall experience for our students

through praying; developing awareness of the needs of others; responding to that growing awareness.

Our whole school Prayer Gathering in the MPLA at 12:00pm led directly into the plain bread roll lunch. This Prayer Gathering was crafted in such a way as to invite the students to engage in a deeper spiritual understanding of authentic social justice action. Engaging with the gospel message and visually understanding some of the current challenges affecting the quality of life for many young Thai people living in slums, were all presented in a deeply prayerful and reflective way. The songs chosen complemented this message - our school community takes social justice action seriously.

Act for Justice, Have Less Lunch - A plain bread roll was supplied for lunch for everyone. Our students were encouraged to forgo their yummy snacks and big lunches and drinks on that day and instead have water and a lesser snack for recess and a bread roll for lunch. This was just a little taste of going without and standing in solidarity with those who have less.

In addition, our students were invited to wear coloured socks on this day as an extra fun way to trigger an awareness of this focus on the needs of others. Such a variety of socks arrived at school!

Gold coin donations - Thank you to all families who have donated gold coins in support of Catholic Mission and the work by Good Shepherd Sisters in the slums of Bangkok. \$253 has so far been raised. This is a marvellous result, for which Catholic Mission are so grateful.



FEAST OF ALL SAINTS

Monday, 1st November, marks the Feast of All Saints. The student and staff community will celebrate this very important Feast of All Saints with Mass at 12pm in the MPLA on Monday. Feast of All Saints allows us time to remember with gratitude all those people whose goodness has inspired us in our faith beliefs and has given us the courage to act on what we believe. Saints are not perfect people, yet are people of integrity. Their love of God and the desire to actively live the message of Jesus has inspired them to live their life with a Christian foundation. We give thanks for those people, in past history and in our lives today, who have given us the example of a way to choose to live life in the love of God, a way which brings dignity and life-enhancing relationship to others. On All Saints Day we remember and honour, not only those saints with a special feast day during the year, but all those other people who have lived a saintly life following the message of Jesus, but who don't have a special feast day.

Tuesday, 2nd November is **the Feast of All Souls.** November is the month traditionally set aside by the Catholic Church to remember and pray for those who have passed away, especially family members and friends.

HALLOWE'EN

Hallowe'en means "All Hallows' Eve", an old-fashioned way of saying "The Eve of All Saints Day". Hallows means honouring as holy. For many centuries, these few days have been a very important time in the Church year. All Saints Day is the entry into November, the month of the Holy Souls whom we remember and for whom we pray. The dates and celebrations of 31 October and 1 November are a combination of pagan and Christian spiritual and cultural ceremonies. The end of October and the beginning of November was the time when ancient Celtic tribes who lived in Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Brittany marked the end of summer with a Harvest Festival on 31 October. There was also a custom of remembering and celebrating the dead, Samhain (pronounced "Sah-win"). Celebrations continued on 1st November as the beginning of a new year and the coming of winter. The Church then brought a Christian meaning to this time, remembering those who lived before us by marking it as All Saints Day.

There is no one explanation of the origins of current "Halloween" activities. They are considered to have originated probably not only from Celtic Ireland and Scotland, but also from ancient European customs dedicated to praying for



the dead. The carved Jack-o-Lantern customs, which were originally carved turnips, and only later pumpkins, probably come from Irish folklore. From the English Catholics came the custom of children going about begging their neighbours for a "Soul Cake" for which they would say a prayer for those neighbours' families and friends who had died. This has evolved into today's practice of 'Trick or Treat'. For Christians, this special time of year definitely has a religious focus on those people who, in their own lives already lived, have shown us the way to live as a friend of Jesus, in our times.

The custom of celebrating Halloween as a party time was brought to America in the 1840s by Irish immigrants for whom it was, and still is, a strong part of their cultural context. They were fleeing their country's potato famine and the social and financial constraints of their British overlords.

Remembrance Day - St Mary MacKillop Singers


