We continue to remember and pray for all people living with war, especially Ukraine, that they will know peace soon.


Thank you for the many ways that you have contributed to our school throughout this term.

Miss Norton and the 2/3 class presented the Last Supper echo mime, which told the story of Jesus' last meal with his friends







Aarvin, Trinity, Bentley, Armani, Savanna and Lucy from Miss Kotz's 3/4 class re-enacted Jesus praying at the Garden of Gethsemane.

Sienna and Maddalyn from Miss Wehr's 2/3 class led the Stations of the Cross. The Stations of the Cross were painted by John Dunn, an Olkola man from Far North Queensland. This painting is seven metres in length. There are four journey tracks that connect. Two integrate the aboriginal story with Christ's own Way of the Cross. Along the top and bottom, tracks made of thorny branches speak of colonisation and its impact on the Aboriginal community.

#### **HOLY WEEK**

On Tuesday morning, the school community came together and reflected on the wonderful event of Jesus' resurrection which is celebrated on Easter Sunday with a meditation on the symbolism and connection of the Easter egg to the empty tomb.





On the prayer focus table, there were symbols used at the previous Holy Week plays. These symbols were all connected with our celebration of Easter.

The brightly coloured Easter egg, is a sign of joy and celebration, and of new life. The large Easter egg was broken and we found that the egg is empty – like the empty tomb from which Jesus rose at Easter time.


At the end of the meditation, the school candle was lit as a sign that Jesus is alive and is with us.

# WHAT'S UP DOC



#### **ChatGDP**

There have been a lot of reports in the media about the recent launch of the free AI chatbot, ChatGPT. Many believe that students need to be prepared for a future filled with artificial intelligence tools, however opinion is divided as to the benefits to education. I have limited knowledge of chatbots, so I decided to do a little research.

Al chatbots draw on vast pools of online content to answer questions by generating sentences, paragraphs and essays. ChatGPT is one of the latest chatbots available and is capable of a variety of tasks including writing responses, as well as solving science and math problems. Some Australian states, and some international school districts, have banned ChatGPT, but SA has not. In fact, SA Education Minister Boyer endorses the decision for SA public schools and universities to use ChatGPT (Gunst 2023). Additionally, Martin Westwell, the Chief Executive of the SA Department for Education, suggests students are able to use chatGPT for some tasks (The Advertiser 2023).

Opinion on the benefits of using AI and ChatGPT in a school are varied. Teachers have been encouraged to use AI and ChatGPT to discover the possibilities they offer – including its use as a teaching tool to unlock student creativity, for personalized learning experiences for students (Reese 2023), to improve teaching practice, and to encourage real-world knowledge application (Mansfield 2023). However, some schools have banned access to ChatGPT amid concerns about safety and accuracy of the content, and concerns that using ChatGPT for some schoolwork, particularly homework tasks, is essentially cheating. Other concerns include a 2022 paper published in the journal Frontiers in Artificial Intelligence which reported that AI technologies should be used with caution as they might diminish cognitive abilities such as learning and memory (Gunst 2023). There are also concerns around use of ChatGPT with current assessment methods and difficulties for out-of-class assessments (Gunst 2023). Further, whilst ChatGPT can create well-written and coherent answers, the bot has been known to be inaccurate (Verma & Oremus 2023) with factual questions often wrong and use of made-up quotes attributed to people that never existed.

After reading about AI and ChatGPT I have a little more information now and am able to take what I have read and form an opinion of my own, based on what I have read. One question I have after reading these opinion pieces is what about critical literacy – does ChatGPT have the ability to create an opinion piece? For example, critical literacy involves students having an opinion about what they read and being able to compare and contrast two different texts. For Year 6 students, the Australian curriculum requires them to analyse, interpret and evaluate, and to connect and compare content from a variety of sources; and identify similarities and differences in literary texts on similar topics, themes or plots. To achieve this, I believe there is a need for students to read widely and to have rich, in-class discussions around the texts they are studying in order to form their own opinions in response. Just as I have done here where I conclude with my own opinion about ChatGPT – that it appears it cannot replace an original opinion piece and that for this reason it has merit but only for some situations. I look forward to learning more.






