WORK EXPERIENCE – WEEK 10



What ignited your passion for your career choice?

WHAT'S UP DOC



Integrated Studies

Many teachers at our wonderful school adopt an integrated approach to curriculum delivery. With a well-publicised over-crowded curriculum, teachers design learning tasks which integrate several subjects, or learning areas.

Integrating curriculum learning areas is not a new approach – it was espoused as early as the 1930s when introduced by notable scholar, Dewey, in 1938. Dewey wrote of integrating curriculum learning areas rather than content being 'learned in isolation ... disconnected from the rest of experience' (pp.48-49). Indeed, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) (2012) calls for teachers 'to deliver the curriculum, drawing on integrated approaches where appropriate' (p.13). Integrated learning tasks help students understand the interconnectedness of ideas (Walshaw 2017).

Approaches to integrating curriculum learning areas include: incorporating in other curriculum learning areas or vice-versa; using multiple curriculum learning areas within a topic or theme; and problem-based or project-based approaches which integrate multiple curriculum learning areas.

YEAR 4/5 DIORAMAS












YEAR 4/5 DIORAMAS




















YEAR 4/5 POETRY

In poetry, we have been learning about figurative language, specifically about using alliteration, simile and personification.


- Alliteration the repetition of the same sound at the start of a word.

- Personification giving non-living things human characteristics.

Students could choose from autumn leaves, spring flowers, hot summer days or cold winter nights for their poetry theme. Here are some student's poems:



IN THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Geography

Students have been looking at water issues in the world with a focus on different countries depending on their year level. The Year 6 students focused on water issues in relation to Asian countries, while Year 7, 8 and 9 students focused on local water issues. Students learnt about the water cycle and how different human factors can affect this. They also investigated how water connects communities such as river systems, and the different environmental, social and economic factors related to water within a community.

Blake: I enjoyed playing the interactive water cycle game on the laptop.

The Arts - Music

Students have recently completed their unit of work on the Music subject. This involved different aspects of music including the elements of music, musical notation and creating their own music. Students were asked to reflect on the music they listen to and investigate what it is that they enjoy about a particular song (e.g. beat, lyrics, theme). They also had the opportunity to write their own music using the correct musical notation and create music with their hands and instruments.

Lucas: I enjoyed sharing with the class the music that I like.

Language

Students have continued the Auslan program, learning different words in sign language that they can use in their everyday lives. Students have worked individually to practise the language and have also been involved in group work where they engaged in conversation using Auslan. Some of the topics that students have covered in Auslan recently include:

- Household items
- Feelings
- Greetings and questions
- Days of the Week/ Months of the Year

Adelaide: I have enjoyed having conversations with others using Auslan and getting to test each other.

Digital Tech

Students have been busy putting the finishing touches on their Lego Spike designs and tweaking the coding. Designs range from designing safer cars to minimise the number of crashes on our roads to designing a public transport system for people (young people in particular) on the Copper Coast.

Austin: I enjoyed using the laptops to do coding and building a car using Lego Spike kits.







IN THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Maths

Measurement has been the focus with students learning how to solve areas of complex shapes and learning about converting units of measurement. The class had to determine how much carpet is needed to replace the carpet in the yellow room in the SHC and came up with different ways to account for the odd shapes with furniture and alcoves.

Riley: I have enjoyed learning about 24hr time and all the different ways to work out area and perimeter.

Out and About in the SHC

Last Friday, the 6-9 students went on an excursion to Moonta where we had lunch at the Port Hughes General Store and had a quick play on the playground. The students then visited the Moonta Museum as our class has been invited to take part in a project collaboration with the Makers Empire and National Trust: Moonta Mine Project. Together we are using Makers Empire software challenge course (a 3D design program) learning about the Moonta Mines and their significance to the region. The students need to choose an exhibit in the museum that they will modify using the design thinking process. Their designs will be 3D printed and some will be turned into an AR experience and placed on display at the Moonta Museum for a period of time. In class, the students have been completing some online learning which has included: video content, quizzes, and design training and challenges, that will help the students strengthen their knowledge and enable them to create their own designs. Our trip to the Museum was to help students get a feel for life back in that time so they can design something that would have made life easier for families living back then. The students then got to make a quick visit to the Lolly shop where they got to buy some yummy treats.










