- Year of history with construction of 7-9 secondary facility and associated planning, preparation, and staffing appointments. August 2021 marked the handover of new facility. Officially opened in 2022.
- Following key areas of focus: •
 - Catholic Identity (Staff Retreat Day; Feast Days celebrated)
 - Teaching and Learning (Continued focus on student driven learning; regular reporting and sharing; successful Learning Expo (students lead conferences sharing learning to parents/caregivers); staff professional learning; class learning activities; and school concert in Term 3, made successful by the hard work and support of staff and parents)
 - Pastoral Care & Community (4-7 Choir participation at annual CSMF; involvement in community events including Kernewek Lowender and Anzac Service; Mini Macs Playgroup continues to thrive, managed well by co-ordinator Felicity Schulz especially adapting to COVID-19 restrictions during the year)
 - **Operations & Management** (Importance of WHS requirements to ensure safe school in every aspect; thanks to Karen Westlake for WHS co-ordination and handover to Emily Donnell; child safety is paramount and underpins policies, practices, and curriculum; induction and screening processes for volunteers and contactors; construction of 7-9 secondary facility completed mid-year, space used from Term 4 onwards)

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 2022 school year was once again another outstanding year in the history of our school; a year to be proud of and celebrated.

We began the year with the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic strongly affecting people everywhere. Efforts to reduce the spread of infection meant that there was a staggered beginning to the school year with students in Reception and Year 7 being the only ones on site with staff for the first two weeks of the year. Students in remaining year levels joined us from Week 3 onwards. Remote or home learning was provided for students at home. COVID-19 continued to affect students and their families and staff all throughout 2022 with many affected by illness and close contact absenteeism.

The effects of the COVID pandemic did not dampen many exciting changes that took place over the course of the year with the most notable being the celebration of the blessing and opening of our newest facility - the Sacred Heart Centre. Special guests included: Bishop Karol Kulczycki (Port Pirie Diocese), Sr Shirley O'Loghlen (RSJ), Sr Christine Schwerdt (RSJ), Mrs Nichii Mardon (Director Catholic Education Port Pirie), Lisa Weetra, (local Nharangga representative), Mr Denis Ralph (SACCS Chair), Mrs Margaret Pope (Copper Coast Council). Many parents and friends joined us as well for the occasion. The weather was kind, and we enjoyed a special morning tea and treats following the formal blessing and opening.

Under the guidance of our Middle School Leader, Lisa Caffyn staff continued to work on making our middle school vision and pedagogy a reality: refining and appointing further staff for our secondary school, and developing policies and procedures. There was much accomplished finishing off the facilities, ordering equipment and resources, developing curriculum; and we will continue to improve our secondary school facility and curriculum offerings over the coming years.

Each year we have a theme across all of the schools in the Port Pirie Diocese. This year the theme was about being open, accepting and welcoming to all, just as Jesus was. The theme of "Who Is My Neighbour?" permeated all areas of our community life throughout the year. We reflected on the neighbours close to us every day - here at school and at home, and our neighbours who are physically further away in other towns, cities, states, and countries. The theme extended into our "Nemo's Neighbours" Dance Concert as well. As well as our high expectations of student in their learning and their efforts in Reading, Spelling, Writing, Maths, Religious Education, The Arts, Science, Italian, HASS, Technology, Health, and PE, we also enjoyed highlights such as:

- our very successful sports day one of the biggest community events of our year
- many and varied sporting and choir opportunities
- Catholic Education Week
- Science Week
- Nemo's Neighbours Dance Concert

- hosting visitors and students for work experience
- Camps to the Narnu farm, Port Vincent, nearby towns of Kadina, Moonta
- Class excursions
- Water/Beach safety lessons for R-5

All events reflected everything that is so good about our school: strong relationships, courage, success, collaboration, excellence, fun, and commitment. We can be proud of all of these opportunities in a year and thankful for them.

With the transition of our school to Year 9 in 2023 and therefore, Year 9 being our graduation year level, this led to celebrating milestones somewhat differently as well. The milestone of finishing primary education with us at Year 6 was acknowledged and celebrated with Year 6 students. Throughout the year they were involved in leadership development opportunities, the Year 6 aquatics camp at Port Vincent, transition to secondary school, an 'end of our primary years' dinner and presentations at our whole school end of year Thanksgiving Mass.

Our historic Blessing and Opening of the Sacred Heart Centre was one that will not go forgotten. We were honoured to have Bishop Karol and Fr Matthew Newman bless this spectacular building with the company of special guests and our whole school community. Students helped to make this day extra special with their liturgical dances, processions, readings, and an on-screen film clip displaying the highlights of our building from our Year 7 and 8 students.

We celebrated fourteen years of service for Gary Whitford at a liturgy held in the MPLA with the whole school. An outstanding number of years and hard work dedicated to the IT department of our school. Our appreciation for Gary's work will not be forgotten.

Our spectacular Winter Appeal was run by our Junior Primary Classes with a film clip promoting the importance of donating warm clothes and goods. All proceeds went to the St Vincent de Paul Society to give to those in need in our local community. Our Student Leaders re-enacted the story of Frederic Ozanam and how he came to be the founder of the St Vincent de Paul Society.







We welcomed Fr Chris to our community at the start of Term 3. It was very fitting to welcome Fr Chris on the same day as our St Mary MacKillop Feast Day Mass. Fr Chris shared his musical talents and remembered a very special saint who dedicated her life to education and our Josephite schools.





Class Masses returned in the Kadina Church throughout this term, which was a nice way to reconnect with one of our local churches.



Our Year 2, 2/3 and 3 classes ran a campaign promoting Catholic Mission via a coin mosaic fundraiser. An incredible \$600 was raised for those around the world in need.

Finally, we were welcomed back to our Star of the Sea Parish Church in Wallaroo during Term 4. We had Whole School Mass to launch this celebrating our 'Who is my Neighbour' theme and final term of the year together. Student Leaders performed a role play for the Gospel of the Good Samaritan. The Reception/Year 1 Class performed a song at the end of Mass where Student Leaders handed out love heart gifts with a message to go and do likewise just as Jesus has taught us in the Gospel reading. Fr Chris ran a Q&A pretending to be characters from the Good Samaritan for his Homily, which was engaging and insightful for all.

MIDDLE SCHOOL REPORT

2022 marked a historic occasion as we welcomed the first group of students to commence Secondary Schooling at St. Mary Mackillop School in the new Sacred Heart Centre. The 7-9 Middle School has had a tremendous year in the making, filled with an abundance of learning, joy, laughter, and life-long memories made.

The Middle School began with the hiring of teacher: Masha Sudareva, ESO: Sue Wharton and Leader of Middle Years: Lisa Caffyn and 14 students (11 Year 7 students and 3 year 8 students). The set-up of curriculum was a huge task and special mention needs to be made to Melanie O'Leary (CESA Education Advisor: Middle Years) for her ongoing support with planning and connecting SMMS with the other sites adding a middle school. Sheridan Bonney also helped to create numerous resources for our middle school.

The Sacred Heart Centre was a hive of activity this year as the students learned various real-life skills. The 7-8s were involved in designing, measuring, sawing, sanding, and making wooden crosses which were blessed by Bishop Karol Kulczycki, and now feature in every space in the Sacred Heart Centre. Students also constructed birdhouses. The students also developed some serious culinary masterpieces in Food Technology. The students got busy baking a variety of food, including sweet and savoury scones, cupcakes, pizzas, pancakes, and gingerbread men, to name a few. Their skills in the kitchen didn't end there; they also worked hard to make coffees as part of their Micro-Credential course and delivered premium lattes and cappuccinos to staff and family visitors over the course of the year.

Term 1

The term began with its challenged due to Covid. The 7/8s returned to school despite many other year levels initially participating in online learning. In Term 1, SMMS held the official opening of the SHC on the 9th March where we welcomed invited guests - Mrs Nichii Mardon, Director Catholic Education Pt Pirie and Professor Denis Ralph, Chair of the South Australian Commission for Catholic Schools.

From a learning perspective, students took part in micro credentials (coffee making) and began to map out the community garden. New events javelin an discus were included in sports day for the middle year students to take part in. The students cooked pancakes for the whole school on Shrove Tuesday. Students also settled into the routine of the middle school with classrooms for different learning areas and a more rigorous learning program across subject areas. They also experienced new subjects such as PBL.

Students used the Mathsspace platform after staff took part in professional development, to enhance their learning in mathematics and allow for another means of data tracking.

Our secondary students also held a Book Club in Term 1. Students read a book of their choice and, each week, met in their Book Club groups to report and share what they had read and what their thoughts and inferences were. They concluded Book Club at the end of the Term with a summary of their book and a rating score, accompanied by some delicious snacks to nibble on whilst they discussed their literary findings.

From a set up perspective, while many purchases were made in the 2022 Christmas holidays, it was not until the building was in use that many more needs were identified. Lots of science equipment was purchased this term as well as wood tech tools and other minor admin purchases. Routines and processes were also

established for the Middle School including running on a separate timetable to the primary school which meant not taking part in Monday morning assemblies. The introduction of a pastoral care lesson and program, movement between rooms and ensuring that learning was purposeful and different from their primary experience. The middle school uniform was also designed (with student input) and introduced. Parent teacher interviews were conducted via phone due to Covid.

Term 2

From a learning perspective in term 2 Year 7/8 students enjoyed their excursion to Adelaide as they visited Parliament House, with thanks to Fraser Ellis for showing them around. They also visited the Mary MacKillop Museum and learnt more about our patron Saint, Mary Mackillop. A visit to the High Street Cafe was a lot of fun, where the students had a delicious lunch and furthered their knowledge about coffee making, with thanks to Mr Beech.

Students worked hard to organise a Reconciliation Week Fundraising stall. The students created their products for the stall, which included: cupcakes made in Food Technology, lolly bags, jellies, frog in ponds, and sewed drawstring bags. Many of the items were purple in recognition of the official colour of National Sorry Day. The stall was sold-out out entirely in the first 15 mins of recess! The students proudly raised a total of \$300 to donate to the Mira Wiru Foundation- a charity that donates fresh fruit and vegetables to remote Indigenous communities in Australia. The class also showcased their Water Advocacy projects they have been working on in HASS at their Expo. They had some excellent initiatives, including an interactive VR experience, a homemade water filter, an informative quiz, a fundraiser event to raise money for a charity, a water bottle challenge to raise awareness about the amount of water young girls in Niger carry every day, informational pamphlets, posters, and PowerPoints!

The students took part in a Headspace program and a parent evening was also offered focusing on the mental health and wellbeing of adolescents.

Staff completed PD in the Become Ed program which is a program designed to teach students about future careers and opportunities. Participation in this program has been subsidized by CESA.

Additional equipment continued to be purchased on a needs basis. Support was sought from CESA to get our 3D printer up and running. Connection with St Joseph's Clare and Peterborough continued as all the Middle Leaders discussed issues and sought opinions from one another.

The Middle School was part of an extensive Work Health and Safety audit which saw a number of items brought up which needed to be addressed. A big thank you to Julia Hammill (BURSA and involved with the build) and Emily Donnell (SMMS WH&S coordinator) for assisting us with the paperwork.

Term 3

The Year 7/8s travelled to Lumination in Adelaide to take part in some learning around Augmented Reality (AR) and Virtual Reality (VR) and learned more about the STEM XR Challenge they were participating in. This opportunity was heavily subsidesed by CESA. In this project, students selected real-world issues related to sustainability and used a design thinking framework to develop ideas and design solutions. Students explored CoSpace and Tinkercad and learned how to use these programs. They also had the opportunity to travel to St Joseph's Peterborough to complete another training with the staff from Lumination. Congratulations to Mia and Chelsea for winning the state-wide competition.

The middle school students were heavily involved in the school dance concert 'Nemo's Neighbours' which performed 2 shows.

The Onguard learning platform was introduced to support students with safety learning in Wood Technology.

Sue and Lisa took part in a chemical handling course as the chemicals required in secondary science require risk assessments which involve the proper storage, labelling, handling and disposal.

The final building defects meeting and signoff for the building was undertaken this term where a number of items still needing addressing were flagged with the architect.

The middle school was part of a SEQTA reporting pilot project where Lisa Caffyn was part of PD. Marks books were set up and the report format was decided upon.

Term 4

The Year 7/8s visited Mylor Adventure Camp in Week 4, Term 4, as their first Middle School camp experience. We all had a wonderful time participating in many different activities, creating lifelong memories, and having lots of laughs. Our first day included archery, a very wet challenge obstacle course, followed by a scenic night walk packed with hide-and-seek games. The next day, full of energy, the students tried their hand at rock climbing on the bouldering walls, various team-building exercises, and raft-making. After a big day of fresh air and exercising, we ended the evening with roasted bonfire marshmallows and homemade damper. On the third and final day of camp, the students bravely conquered the giant swing- a 15-metre drop that sent students swinging through the air, secured safely with a harness. For many, this was the highlight of their trip despite being initially apprehensive about it. Our last activity to wind down from the week's events was fishing and yabbying at the Onkaparinga River.

The students took part in the SMMS Twilight Markets as part of their Business and Economics unit where each group had to create a small business. Their stalls were a huge success on the night.

The Middle School reporting process was completed using SEQTA along with support from Deborah Kroeger from CESA. These were generated with minimal issues.

Numerous sporting opportunities were offered to our middle school students over the course of the year including Interschool athletics (term 1) which was unfortunately cancelled due to Covid restrictions, 7/8 Basketball Carnival in Minlaton which a number of our students participated. Our boys played in a SMMS team and our girls joined with Moonta and the Football carnival at Maitland where our boys joined with Ardrossan.

Overall, it has been a huge year, and the students have shown great determination, hard work, and pride in their learning- both in the classroom and outside of it.

WORK HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT

During 2022 we were pleased to have Karen Westlake as WHS Officer in Term 1 and Emily Donnell returned to the position in Term 2.

St Mary MacKillop School endeavours to comply with all WHS obligations which are monitored by Catholic Church Insurances. The aim is to minimise the risk of injury to all workers and other persons in the organisation's worksite by ensuring that the Work, Health and Safety and Injury Management system is implemented, monitored, reviewed and continually improved. All Policies and Procedures listed in the Catholic Education Safety Manual are reviewed each year. The reviews can be scheduled to be completed on a monthly, quarterly or yearly basis, dependant on the policy. Catholic Church Insurances have a system which lists all items for review on a rotating calendar. The system is thorough, ensuring all procedures have to be completed.

This year the Emergency Management and Disaster Recovery Plan was developed and implemented at our site. The Emergency Management and Disaster Recovery Plan will be reviewed on an annual basis. It provides the framework around recovery from a major disaster.

A Working With Children check is required to be completed by all employees, volunteers, contractors, work experience students aged over 14 years and other workplace participants in our school prior to commencement at our school. A Working With Children check is valid for five years. Working With Children Checks already held by individuals are accepted and are associated with the school. The school absorbs the cost of the checks for staff and volunteers. The Catholic Education Office enforces this practice, and our school undertakes regular audits for correct working with children check requirements.

A WHS Induction is completed when new staff, volunteers or contractors commence at school, usually on the day of commencement. The induction, which is role relevant, informs of their WHS responsibilities, emergency procedures and first aid information. Staff and contractors are inducted individually. Staff, Volunteers and contractors are required to be re-inducted every five years. Ms Michelle Miller conducted two volunteer induction sessions during 2022.

A Training Needs Analysis Register for staff is continually updated throughout the year to verify all employees are up to date with training. Training completed by staff this year includes Work Health Safety for Officers, Senior First Aid, CPR First Aid, Information Security Awareness, Mental Health in the Workplace, Behaviour Support Strategies, 7-hour and 3 hour Responding to Risks of Harm, Abuse and Neglect, Emergency Evacuations and Lock-Ins. Some training is now completed online through the SALT program from Catholic Education South Australia allowing staff a semester to complete the required modules.

Each term an emergency drill is performed by the whole school. This alternates between an Evacuation or a Lock In. New evacuation maps were designed to include the Sacred Heart Centre (7-9 building). Evacuation maps are located at all room/area exit doors. The practice drills are completed to ensure our procedures are safe and efficient, and also prepare the children if an incident was to arise. Fire Wardens for 2022 were Paul Northeast, Sue Wharton, Heather Griffits and Lisa Cooper.

All staff and visitors to the school are required to sign in using the SINE system when arriving and sign out when leaving. This assists the school if there is an evacuation or lock in, advising who is on school grounds.

Risk Assessments are completed by staff on tasks performed at school eg excursions, camps, experiments, grounds and maintenance work etc, to ensure safe practice procedures are adhered to. If any hazards are identified, controls are put in place to minimize any risk.

Workplace Safety Inspections are conducted in Terms 2 and 4. Each classroom/area completes an inspection and any issues identified are placed on a Hazard Register for immediate attention. If a hazard is reported outside of the inspections, they also are actioned immediately.

St Mary MacKillop School is committed to following safe practices in the workplace and the school environment with the whole school community contributing to this.

OSHC / VACATION CARE REPORT

Our service was in high demand throughout 2022. Generally, between 8 to 24 students would attend OSHC each afternoon.

Children attending Pre-School also attend OSHC. Staff collect the children from Wallaroo Pre-school using the school bus to transport them back.

Once again, feedback both through personal conversation and feedback gathered through surveys indicated strong and positive support for the way the service is run and the types of activities and interactions the students have with our staff.

Programming and planning are a significant part of our work. Each week, activities are planned generally chosen by the students or involving significant celebration days. Students are involved in all the planning including the menu and food choices at our OSHC and Vacation care program, Children also participate in cooking activities to make afternoon snack. Our Program is run through Early Works which allows families to view our program and their children's profiles which includes, learning stories, photos and more.

The OSHC garden has proved particularly popular with the students. They love looking after the garden Planting seeds when seasons change and checking vegetables/herbs day to day as they grow. This has grown a great sense of ownership and care for creation and staff have regularly spoken about the environmental and sustainability benefits of growing your own produce. Students have also been helping to look after the chickens and collect the eggs and sell them in the school holidays to families to help by more chicken feed.

We farewelled Alex Wehr in Term 1, Tallara Miller at the end of Term 2 and Clare Owen in Term 3. We welcomed Alain Mattin at the beginning of Term 3 and Tamika King to OSHC at the end of Term 3.

We acknowledge the great work of our staff in creating and maintaining an excellent OSHC program and providing a very positive and high-quality service for the families of our school.

Overall, it was an extremely busy, successful and rewarding year at OSHC and we look forward to another one ahead this year.
