

CLASSROOM PULSE SURVEY

Students R-9 will participate in the classroom pulse survey conducted over this week and next week. The students do the online survey every term. The surveys provide a snapshot of information about the child for the staff to be aware of and respond to if needed.

Students respond to statements such as:

- My teacher cares for me
- I feel safe at school
- I have friends at school
- My teacher helps me when I have problems
- I can have a say in my learning
- I feel I belong in this school
- I currently feel I matter to my teacher
- I have positive relationships in this school
- I currently feel I am thriving in this school
- When asked, my teacher helps me manage friendship issues
- I feel my learning needs are being met
- I am actively involved in co-constructing my learning

Positive relationships are key for children to feel comfortable to then be able to learn to potential. It is important for our staff to know our students really well and the surveys are one tool that assists with this. Students express their thoughts and feelings in so many different ways and this provides an opportunity through the survey format. Students may express something in a survey format that they do not feel comfortable talking about in person. Participating in these surveys also allows for building longitudal information about the child, or information over a period of time.

SUBSIDISED TRANSPORT COSTS FOR SCHOOL BUSES

We are always pleased and thankful to be able to provide significantly subsidised transport costs for our families who access our school buses.

Catholic Education South Australia continues to work with State Government to enable equitable access to school buses for children attending Catholic schools in regional South Australia.

Families who access a school-managed bus service and who reside more than 5km from their nearest regional Catholic school receive a subsidy worth 60% of the annual cost of accessing the school bus, thanks to a grant from the government.

Our school will ensure that any family who has children attending this school who qualify for the bus subsidy will receive this discount.

Wherever possible, funding will also be allocated to address issues that may exist for individual families in order to support their children in accessing transport to and from school.

KADINA AFTERNOON BUS SERVICE

Michael Dennis and I have been in conversation about the CCSLC Kadina bus stop. Michael has noticed that where he usually parks for drop-off at the CCSLC, it is getting busier. At times Michael is unable to park there so pulls into the first row of car parks and then stops.

This however is not ideal, and the bus then obstructs traffic and parents wanting to leave asap. Parents cannot leave until Michael leaves. We feel this is not ideal for parents and potentially unsafe.

There is a designated bus zone area located in the middle of carpark and we would like to propose that this be the drop off area. Michael's observation is that the designated bus area generally is always very quiet therefore much safer for everyone.

We would only make this change for ease of traffic and safety of students. If you would be affected by this proposed change, we would appreciate your feedback about it. Please have a quick chat with Michael or call me or respond by email with your thoughts as to whether you would find this still convenient and safe for the students.

We will work towards commencing this as of **Monday**, **4**th **September**, pending responses from families.



FR ADRIAN RETURNED TO GOD



WHAT'S UP DOC?



Critical Literacy

This week is Book Week where we celebrate quality literature and of course, the pure joy of reading!

As students become more skilful readers, the school curriculum requires them to develop their critical literacy skills. To be critically literate means being able to consider more than the surface-level meanings of texts (Duggan 2020). This means students need to read texts from others' perspectives to understand different points of view even if they disagree (Janks 2019). The Australian English curriculum requires students to develop their critical literacy abilities throughout their school years, starting in Reception. The following examples of student outcomes are taken directly from varying year levels of the English curriculum. Students are required to:

- Understand that texts serve different purposes (to inform, persuade, entertain etc),
- Understand ideas in texts can be conveyed from different viewpoints and can be interpreted in different ways,
- Understand how texts relate to their contexts and reflect the society and culture in which they were created,
- Create a personal response to the ideas, characters and viewpoints in texts, including relating texts to their own experiences, and
- Analyse strategies authors use to influence readers.

Being critical involves more than a student comprehending what they read. It involves students discussing texts in detail and teachers posing questions to direct students' thinking. Our teachers use varying approaches to encourage students to reflect on texts read at school. We ask questions such as 'What kind of person would agree with this text? What does the author want us to know? What do the illustrations suggest? How are children/refugees/elderly presented in the text? What knowledge does the reader need to have to understand the text? How would the text be different if it were told in another time/place/culture?' This sounds very complicated, so let me illustrate this using two of the current Book Week shortlisted books and share with you discussions students could participate in to develop a critical response to each text.

Runt by Craig Silvey is the winning text in the 8 to 12 year old category. It follows Annie and her dog Runt, who live in a country town and who must beat the odds to save the family farm. This text has themes of family, community, the Outback, sustainability, heroes and villains. On page 216, Susie explains aeroplane etiquette to Annie and Bryan. To lead a discussion around this, students could be asked 'What does this reveal about the characters and their experiences? What does this context (never being on a plane before) reveal about the Shearers' lives? Is this similar or different to students' own contexts?'

Farmhouse, a shortlisted picture book written by Sophie Blackall, is based on a real family and their farmhouse. This farmhouse has an exterior landscape depicting the work done on a farm. The interior reveals how this farming family relates to this landscape. Students could be asked 'What are the differences between this home and a city house?' Further, the squirrels, swallows, moths, raccoons, mice, bats, wasps and bear who invade the abandoned farmhouse are typical of the environment. Students could be asked 'If a house were abandoned in your local area, which animals might be likely to visit the abandoned house to take shelter there?'

Through ample discussion around the texts our students are reading, we develop their critical literacy skills and their ability to respond to what they read with opinion and criticality.

IN THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

SCIENCE

This term the focus is on Chemical Science. Students have been learning about reversable and irreversible changes, the difference between a solution and a solute and chemical reactions. Students can light a Bunsen burner and know the difference between the two flames. They are learning how to conduct scientific experiments, controlling the variables and how to interpret their results.

Lucas: Its pretty cool because we use the Bunsen burner to heat water to see how quickly it will get to 100 degrees.

Jordan: It is fun because we get to use a Bunsen burner.

Adelaide: I like that we get to do heaps of pracs.





HISTORY

This term the Middle School students have been learning about perspectives and sources in History. They have learnt to find primary and secondary sources and how to evaluate sources. Students have taken on the perspective of individuals in different periods of history to write a diary entry. Year 6s have stepped into the shoes of convicts, governors and Indigenous characters in Colonial Australia; Year 7/8s have been peasants and kings in Medieval Europe; and the Year 9s have been exploring life during World War 1.

ADELAIDE EXCURSION

Last Wednesday the 6-9 students went to Adelaide for an excursion. First stop was the Planetarium where we were able to see images of the night sky and many of the constellations. We were shown constellations we can see in the sky at night and how the path of the sun changes. We also were shown the effect light pollution is having on the night sky.

Next we went to Parliament House, where we were lucky to have a guided tour by Fraser Ellis MP who explained the history behind the building, showed us the chambers, and explained what happens behind the scenes. He pointed out lots of things of interest along the way including an Orrery in the library.

Students were then able to purchase lunch from a food court in the Mall.

After lunch, we went to the Museum where we looked closely at how exhibits are set up. This was in preparation for the assignment this term in History. Students also had fun looking at various exhibits.


SCHOOL PHOTOS – THURSDAY, 28TH SEPTEMBER
