

WORLD TEACHERS' DAY - Friday, 27th October

This Friday we will be celebrating World Teachers' Day. This year's theme is Hats off to Teachers. It is a day when we offer gratitude to our teachers as we show them the love and gratitude they deserve for helping us in all that we do.

ALLHALLOWTIDE – 31st October to 2nd November

Allhallowtide is a kind of triduum: three days of commemoration that includes All Hallows Eve (October 31, shortened Hallowe'en), All Saints Day (All Hallows Day, November 1), and All Souls Day (November 2). As with other major feasts, celebration of All Saints Day begins on the vigil, which is why secular culture celebrates Halloween on the night of October 31st, but then does nothing on the actual feast days that follow.

Halloween gets its name from "All Hallows Eve" and is the vigil of All Saints Day. The spooky imagery of Halloween reminds us of the evil that is defeated when we gain eternal life in heaven.

All Saints Day is when we celebrate the Communion of Saints in heaven who pray for us and look to them for encouragement in our own journey to salvation. All Souls Day is when we are invited to pray for the souls of those in our community who have died.

As this is such an important observance in the Catholic Church, it is known as a holy day of obligation, and the faithful are expected to attend Mass on the day.

Parish Mass will be celebrated in Wallaroo Church at 11.45am on Wednesday, however we will not be attending as a whole school. If you would like your children to attend, please let me know as we will make this possible.

I am part of a few Catholic social groups, and they are sharing that many families are celebrating in a way both faithful and festive by ditching costumes of ghouls and goblins in favour of their favourite Saints. It's a festival with deeply religious roots and today being resurrected as a time of remembering Saints and departed souls.

WHAT'S UP DOC



Gifted and Talented

St Mary MacKillop School (SMMS) is committed to providing a learning programme which caters in different ways for students' diverse range of unique talents, interests, abilities and capacity to learn. The Australian Curriculum aims to develop each student's academic, intellectual, social, emotional, spiritual and physical abilities including for those students with additional learning needs such as the gifted and talented.

'There is no universally accepted definition of students identified as gifted and talented. A common understanding is that giftedness and talent in students result in their displaying a selection of characteristics at home and school that are significantly above the average for their age' (Australian Curriculum 2023).

The Australian Curriculum adopts the *Gagne Model of Giftedness and Talent* (ACARA 2023). This model defines giftedness as an individual possessing untrained superior natural abilities, in at least one ability domain (intellectual, creative, socio-affective, sensorimotor), which places them in at least among the top 10 percent of his or her age peers' (Gagne 2000). In contrast, talents are those which develop when these natural abilities are developed into skills characteristic of a particular field of human activity or performance (language, science, puzzles, mechanics, arts, social action, athletics, sport). Hence, talent is defined as the superior mastery of systematically developed abilities (or skills) and knowledge in at least one field of human activity to a degree that places an individual at least among the top 10 percent of age peers who are or have been active in that field or fields. Gagne explains that talent is developed from an individual's giftedness.

The teaching program at SMMS provides all students with challenge and stretch, to think critically and creatively, to develop a life-long enthusiasm and love of learning, and to develop a global perspective and the ability to adapt to change. We provide a learning environment that is challenging, with appropriate interventions in and out of the classroom. Gifted and talented students enjoy a differentiated curriculum that may provide extension, withdrawal and acceleration experiences as appropriate for each student. This allows them to learn at their optimum rate, maximising opportunities for self-fulfilment and development.

Additional activities are provided to ensure gifted and talented students are extended by participating in rigorous and stimulating learning opportunities across the learning areas, for example in the disciplines of STEM, Critical Literacy and Design Thinking. Opportunities are also provided to put their learning to the test through competitions and other external stretch activities.


Eloise Crawshaw Class of 2003 (Year 7)
