Your generous support this Lenten Season will enable Caritas Australia to provide life-changing support to communities facing poverty, food insecurity, lack of education, and water shortages, while building resilience against future challenges. Together, through faith and action, we can bring hope and opportunity to those most in need.

This Lent, we're invited to *Unite Against Poverty* with Caritas Australia's Project Compassion. This year is especially significant as we celebrate the Jubilee Year - a time of renewal and solidarity.



Project Compassion 2025 shares three stories from around the world. We'll meet Toefuata'iga - (Toy-foo-ah-tah-ing-ah) a young student from Samoa who faced severe water shortages at her school. Thanks to Caritas Australia and the generosity of supporters like you, her school now has a 10,000 L water tank improving hygiene and allowing the teachers to prioritise education.

We'll get to know Lam from Vietnam, born with short stature, Lam faced social exclusion and limited employment opportunities through the I-SHINE program, Lam is now a freelance graphic designer.

And we'll meet Irene from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) who faced immense challenges after losing her father to war and raising her children in poverty. With support from Caritas Australia, Irene received vocational training in sewing and farming and can now support her whole family.

Toefuata'iga - (Toy-foo-ah-tah-ing-ah) is a 13-year-old primary school student from Samoa. Samoa may be a country surrounded by water, but access to clean drinking water is scarce in some areas, with many families facing extreme hardship as a result.

Toefuata'iga's school community struggled without reliable access to clean water, which impacted students' education and hygiene. Teachers often had to leave the school to fetch water from nearby homes, disrupting lessons and adding strain to the community. When the water ran out at the school, students were sent home which meant they missed out on valuable learning time.

Thanks to the support of Caritas Australia in partnership with Caritas Samoa, Toefuata'iga's school now has a 10,000 L water tank through a Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) program. Teachers and students are now able to focus on education and improved hygiene.

"Now that we have the water tank, things are so much better, we can stay at school all day, and I get to spend more time learning and playing with my friends. I'm happy that we don't have to go home early anymore." - said Toefuata'iga.

This transformative story is just one example of how Caritas Australia's Project Compassion creates waves of change around the world.


### YEAR 4/5 BOOKSTORE FUNDRAISER

### **OUR SCHOOL LOGO**



Did you know that our school logo is based on the original school emblem that Sr Fergus designed in 1926 for the borders and day students at St Joseph's School, Port Lincoln?

The emblem was adopted more broadly by the Sisters of Saint Joseph in other schools from then and is still used in some form with many Josephite schools today.

The emblem uses the Latin words to make a unique statement about the school's culture: In omnibus caritas: Love in everything.



The colour scheme was also significant in the design.

Gold: the Divine and human love referred to in the motto.

Blue: symbolic of Mary, the Mother of God and husband of St Joseph.

**Brown:** symbolises St Joseph. The word Joseph means 'growth'. The lily is often used in the emblems and in images of St Joseph, which represents integrity in life and character.

The three points at the top of the shield may be reference to St Joseph, Jesus at the centre and St John the Baptist.

### TRINITY'S SURF LIFE SAVING STATE CHAMPIONSHIP 2024-2025

Trinity's results saw her beat her personal bests from the previous year and competed in all the Final heats except one where she missed out by one spot, in the semi-final.

Trinity not only won her first Gold Medal for 100m Sprints, she also ranked higher on the leadership board, meaning that next season she goes up divisions but also has higher stakes to maintain.

Trinity did not do her Iron Women or her Swim and Surf Team events this year at States, but off-season training for these for U13 will begin soon.

Trinity went from Ranked 71 with 889 points (2023/2024) to Ranked 36 with 3088 points (2024/2025), that is one huge jump in ranking, a lot of dedication and training throughout the off season has definitely paid off.







### CONGRATULATIONS EAMON

On Sunday, 2 March, Eamon Webel as part of the Northern Yorke Peninsula Little Athletics Centre (NYPLAC), competed at the Little Athletics Yorke Peninsula Country Championships held in Kadina. Athletes from our home club as well as from Mid North Clare, Adelaide Plains Giants, Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Districts, and Whyalla Little Athletics Centres were invited to attend to compete for medals in their age groups, as well as for the Country Championships Shield which is presented to the Club/Centre with the highest points average.

Eamon competed in the U10's long jump, 60m hurdles, 200m, 400m and 800m races. He ran brilliantly and achieved PB's in the 200m and 400m races. He also achieved the full points score of 40, to be awarded the U10 boys champion gold medal winner. Northern Yorke Peninsula also took home the shield this year so there was double the celebration.

His sister, Shae, also competed in the U7's and achieved a big PB in her 500m race. It was a fantastic day.

Well done to them both.
