The dates for National Reconciliation Week remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

We all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and in playing our part we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures.

26th May – Sorry Day

National Sorry Day or the National Day of Healing is an annual event held annually in Australia on 26 May commemorating the Stolen Generations. It is part of the ongoing efforts towards reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

27th May – 3rd June – National Reconciliation Week

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

3rd June – Mabo Day

Mabo Day commemorates Mer Island man Eddie Koiki Mabo and his successful efforts to overturn the legal fiction of terra nullius, or 'land belonging to no-one'.

We have some significant Feast days or Solemnities, (special observances) in the Catholic Church coming up over the next few weeks:



THE VISITATION OF MARY - FRIDAY 30TH MAY

The feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrates the visit of Mary, the Mother of God, with the child Jesus in her womb, to her cousin Elizabeth. The visit took place when Elizabeth was herself six months' pregnant with her own child who would be Saint John the Baptist.

THE ASCENSION – SUNDAY 1ST JUNE

The Feast of the Ascension in the Catholic Church is a solemnity commemorating the bodily ascension of Jesus into heaven on the fortieth day after Easter. It's a major feast day, ranking with Easter, Pentecost, and Christmas. The Ascension is celebrated as a completion of Jesus' earthly mission and the inauguration of his glorified reign.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

P & F – FRIDAY LUNCHES

We welcome more volunteers to make sure we can offer Friday Lunches for students.

I am interested but what does it involve?

Our P & F and loyal volunteers raise approximately \$10,000 per year through the Friday lunches.

- Free lunch
- Bring along younger siblings
- Get to meet new people
- Your children will love having you volunteering at school

What to expect:

- Commit from 9am until 1.15pm
- You will be rostered on with someone who is experienced

What does a morning at lunches look like?

- A little bit of admin to start with: collect the lunch boxes collate the orders, stick the orders onto the lunch bags
- Take items out of the freezer
- Bag up cold items: drinks, ice creams
- Airfry the chicken nuggets; make hot dogs; add hot water to the ever popular noodles

SEMESTER 2 REPORTS

Teachers are continuously working on assessment pieces and writing reports documenting student progress, the Semester 2 reports will be sent home on the last day of this term, Friday 4th July. Reports cannot be collected earlier than dismissal time on Friday 4th July. If students are not at school on this day, student reports may be collected at the start of Term 3 or on request can be mailed home to parents.

It is a requirement of Catholic Education South Australia that we use a student report writing programme called Marksbook, which sits within the platform of SEQTA. There is an introductory page for parents with the report. The reports for Reception students are required to be different to Years 1-9 reports, there are no grades allocated to subject areas in Reception reports.

Rest assured that while the report format may appear more minimal, all of the assessment and evidence of achievement gathered and collated by teachers is still behind the report. There is always the opportunity to request a parent/teacher interview following receipt of the report if more information and explanation is helpful.

There are options for alternative reports where a student has support and adjustments to their learning so that they are able to achieve to the best of their ability in their learning. This will be indicated on the student's report with the following headings:

- AAS: students accessing a different year level curriculum area
- AYL: students accelerated, assessed at an accelerated year level for a curriculum area
- HPC: students accessing highly personalised curriculum

NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA

Every year we are required to record data for the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on students with a disability. Students who have a Personalised Plan For Learning (PPL) that documents adjustments made to enable them to access learning equitably will be included in our school data. Parents will have been notified if your child as a PPL.

STUDENT PULSE SURVEYS

During Week 5 and 6 of each term, students participate in the Student Pulse Surveys. These surveys provide an opportunity for students to share their perspectives on a variety of questions relating to their wellbeing and learning. The results are used to improve our practices and supports for students.

A Culinary World Tour in Food Technology

Last term in Food Technology, students embarked on a delicious journey around the globe. Over several weeks, they "visited" countries including India, Italy, China, and Mexico, exploring each region's cuisine and food culture. Alongside this global adventure, they also delved into sustainable farming practices and brainstormed practical solutions to support a more sustainable future in agriculture.

This term, in Week 3, students completed their final assessment task. They were asked to choose a country and bring it to life through a food truck concept. This included designing a logo, selecting a colour scheme, creating a uniform, planning a culturally themed menu, and preparing one dish from that menu. A key part of the task involved researching a recipe from their chosen country and determining whether it could be realistically prepared within the lesson's time constraints.

The final presentations were a hit, drawing in several staff members who came to admire the displays and sample the delicious creations.

- Unfortunately, Charlotte and Charlize were absent, so we missed out on their Italian-themed dishes.


